THIS LITTLE LIGHT OF MINE

Today we will celebrate and acknowledge a beautiful gift our church has been given. This gift is light! This is a wonderful gift that will show people the way. They can always walk toward those lights on the steeple. They will arrive at our church, and can ask for help if they wish.

There are many different kinds of light in this world. There are warning lights. Up the street from my home are the train tracks. These lights are lit and the gates come down to warn us. It is not safe to go. A train is coming. We have headlights on our cars. They show us the way to go, but they also keep us safe by showing us people, animals or things to not run into. Like I saw on the news today this recall: Do you have this in your home, or do you drive this kind of car? There are red lights, and caution lights at road crossings. The caution light tells us to watch carefully. Now as I learned in late October even though I saw the caution light I went through it. But someone else also decided to go through it at the same time. Needless to say, that didn't work out very well. Now I have a heart jumping into my throat every time I go through a light that turns yellow when I am already in the intersection. When we see a red light that means stop. I know

for a fact that the vast majority of us have seen or even accidently gone through a red light in our days.

Then we have lights that guide us. Lights at the hospital are visible from quite far away and are there to guide us to that safety net.

Our own lights at home can guide us to the door, or across the yard from the car. Street lights can guide us to help us stay on the road or walkway.

The headlights on our vehicles can guide us to stay on the road, and to help us see so that we do not hit anything, or anyone. They also help us see in storms of rain or snow.

I know that sometimes we feel our light is insignificant in such a hurting world as we are in now. But we see on Christmas Eve when we sing Silent Night. The lights are turned off and everyone in the sanctuary holds a candle that is lit by passing

the light along the rows. Look how powerful those little lights appear when they are all combined!

Everyone who volunteers at any of these activities, or other places in the community are shining their lights to help and guide others. We know that when we have a large activity, we need many volunteers. The OK kids garage sale, Yuletide Fare, Friday Breakfasts, and Sunday suppers all require many volunteers. Every volunteer that helps is a shining light. And we know how big of an impact we can make when there are lights all shining together.

I know myself that sometimes it is hard to be that light all the time. We have sad days when we struggle to keep that little light shining. But during those times we can depend on other shining lights to help and guide us through our sadness, or struggle. As mentioned in our gospel reading for today.
